From the Principal: James van Gelderen

I am pleased to present the 2024 Annual Report for Pacific Coast Christian School.

As a school, we continue to grow as an authentic Christian learning community—Christ-centred, Bible-based, and Spirit-led. Our dedicated and passionate staff once again delivered a high-quality education grounded in Christian beliefs. Their commitment to personalised instruction, innovative pedagogy, and rigorous curriculum design enabled our students to thrive academically and personally. Throughout 2024, we witnessed remarkable student growth—in knowledge and character.

Living out our faith through action continued to be a characteristic of student life. Through the Pacific Journey service-learning program, local outreach, and the Fiji mission trip, students engaged deeply with communities both near and far. These experiences helped develop empathy, compassion, and a heart for servant leadership. The Fiji mission trip was a particular highlight for students and staff, and it was pleasing to see our partnership with Vitogo District School in Fiji grow stronger.

Our tradition of hosting international guests flourished again in 2024. We welcomed several overseas school groups for short-term study tours. These visits gave our International Student Ambassadors the opportunity to shine as cultural hosts and buddies, demonstrating hospitality, leadership, and Christ-like love in action. Pacific Coast is part of a large gathering of Christian Educators who share our heart for seeing lives changed by God so that young people can go out and serve in His world. It was exciting to host educators from some of our Sister Schools in Hong Kong. These cross-cultural exchanges enriched both our visitors and our school community—reminding us that loving others well is a powerful testimony of our faith.

Strengthening partnerships remained a priority throughout 2024. We were blessed by the involvement of parents, alumni, local churches, and community members who contributed to a wide range of activities, including:

A particular highlight from 2024 was the outdoor movie night. This was a wonderful evening where our school community came together to enjoy a relaxing night under the stars.

A significant highlight of the year was our school musical, The Little Mermaid. Performed across two sold-out nights, the production showcased the exceptional talent, dedication, and creative spirit of our students. Participation in the musical developed valuable life skills—teamwork, time management, public speaking—and gave students a joyful space to express their creativity. It was more than a performance; it was a celebration of community and the arts and will be remembered fondly for years to come.

The Waratah Project continued to enrich our commitment to educational equity and cultural respect for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. In 2024, the Project team led initiatives including:

- A moving NAIDOC Week celebration,
- Community BBQs and Elders' morning teas,
- Attendance at Waratah events across NSW

These events deepened relationships in our community and promoted mutual learning, understanding, and respect.

Construction on the Performing and Creative Arts Building progressed rapidly throughout 2024 and was completed in November. Students and staff were excited to use the Building for:

- Specialist classrooms for Music, Visual Art, and Drama,
- Individual and group music practice rooms,
- One Maker Academy lessons
- Collaborative spaces to nurture artistic excellence

We eagerly anticipate the impact this new space will have on student creativity and expression in the years to come.

As we reflect on 2024, we do so with gratitude and hope. I wish to sincerely thank our Staff, Parents, Students, and Wider Community for your unwavering support, encouragement, and trust. Most of all, we give thanks to our Heavenly Father, whose grace and provision continue to guide our school. 2024 has seen continued significant interest by the parents of the **Pacific Coast Christian School** community as they perceive that the school is a safe place for their children and a place where a variety of learning activities is normal both for student with strong academic capacity and those with other practical ways of learning. About our School

Pacific Coast is a transdenominational Christian School that has been in operation since 2008.

Our vision is to provide a Christian educational community as a centre of teaching, learning and serving excellence, founded on Biblically-based beliefs, values and behaviour.

We are committed to authentic Christianity, to excellence in education and to genuine community.

We pursue our vision from a Biblical base by aiming to be authentically Christian, to provide quality education and to practise Christian community that is rigorous, authentic and collaborative.

Seeking to transform the hearts and minds of its students through instruction in the Truth and the experience of gracious Christian care within the bounds of high expectations, the School prioritises stewardship of individual talent for the glory of God and in service of others.

Characteristics of our student body

In 2024, our school catered to students from Prep to Year 12. Located in Tweed Heads, NSW, our campus serves a diverse student community. Many students commute to school on buses, which travel as far north as Robina in QLD and as far south as Pottsville and Murwillumbah in Northern NSW.

The total enrolment for 2024 was 631 students, distributed as follows: -

Junior School: 260 students

Middle School: 234 students

Senior School: 137 students

The gender distribution across the school is approximately equal, with the number of boys slightly less than girls. Our students represent 15 different cultural backgrounds.

Throughout the year, Experience Days continued to be a highlight for both students and families. These gatherings offered space for practical shared learning, laughter, and memorable moments—whether through science practicals, sports events, or simply the joy of meeting together in person. One of the most memorable contributions came from guest speaker Russell Boyce, who engaged families during Science Week with deep insights, particularly for our physics students!

We saw our students grow not only in knowledge but in understanding of God's love, with many stepping forward to serve others in quiet but powerful ways. Whether it was encouraging a peer, participating despite illness, or showing up with joy after personal challenges, these stories were woven through our year as reminders of God's grace at work in the lives of our young people. The diversity of experiences this year was truly remarkable. For those who could not be there in person, all events were live streamed so that the wider school community remained united and engaged.

In every stage of learning, from year 7 through to 12, students have been encouraged to grow in understanding and faith. Our Stage 4 programs were strengthened with new resources and supports, helping younger learners flourish in their transition to high school. Senior students continued to pursue courses in a wider range of areas, including many doing TVET and SBAT options. We have seen growth in engagement of students with many demonstrating thoughtful analysis, perseverance, and a desire to contribute meaningfully to class discussions and assignments. The academic development we've witnessed has been underpinned by a commitment to understand each students unique learning story, supported by our dedicated teaching and support staff.

One of the exciting this year has been seeing students reflect on what it means to live out Biblical perspectives in their learning. As part of our regular devotions and pastoral care, students were invited to consider how Christ's love shapes the way we treat one another, pursue truth, and respond to challenge. We continue to see the fruit of a growing community that makes space for questions, kindness, and growth.

This year it was also encouraging to see some students represent the school in sports such as horse riding or mountain biking. It has also been wonderful to celebrate the achievements of our students in sports beyond the school, with students participating in high level Tennis, Gymnastics, soccer to name a few. These moments gave students opportunities to step outside their comfort zones and build confidence and friendships in a unique and safe environment.

Our staff team undertook many different training opportunities together this year, of note, was the whole staff completing the ETLS program as well as completing professional reading together. The teaching team continue to train and develop resources inspired by the Transformation by Design framework.

As we look forward, the journey of Pacific Online Christian School continues to unfold. Plans are underway to further develop our senior programs, strengthen our parent engagement through tools like Canvas, and pursue formal recognition as a separate school under the Australian Education Act. These steps will enable us to serve more families and build on the foundation that has been so faithfully laid.

We remain committed to being to be a Christ-centred, digitally connected, and community focused school. We give thanks to God for all He has done this year and trust Him with the year to come.

At the completion of the calendar year Our school community included 120 female and 91 male students, reflecting a slightly higher number of girls enrolled. Our school represents 11 different cultural backgrounds.

Student outcomes in standardised national literacy and numeracy testing

NAPLAN Testing Summary of data provided in Scout of the results at the school level reports 2024

Pacific Coast Christian School students received pleasing results in the 2024 NAPLAN (National Assessment Program- Literacy and Numeracy). The school achieved results at the State average in most areas, though it was below average in a significant minority. NAPLAN provides a snapshot of student achievement in the key areas of literacy and numeracy and is used by the school along with other standardised testing, formative and summative assessment and teacher feedback to assist each student to develop key skills that they can use to honour and glorify God.

This shows that PCCS is achieving at a similar rate to schools with a similar student profile in all areas except Year 9 numeracy.

The school performed above the national average for writing in Year 3 but below the national average for writing and spelling in Year 5. Our school performed below the national average for Grammar and numeracy in Year 7. Year 9 remained close to the national average across most areas only performing below the national average for Numeracy

The school also has the similar percentage (94%) of students taking NAPLAN as the national average (95%). 2024 shows similar or improved results across all Years and all domains, only Year 9 is showing slightly lower results in Grammar and numeracy than 2023, against similar schools.

The Year 3 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 3 results have become more stable in recent years, and there are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools.

The strongest domain is writing.

The Year 5 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 5 results have become more stable in recent years, and there are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools.

The strongest domain is reading.

The Year 7 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas. Year 7 results are generally stable, but they have declined slightly in all areas except writing. There are no longer any areas that are 'below' or 'well below' similar schools.

The strongest domain is writing.

The Year 9 cohort remained close to the achievement of similar schools in all areas except numeracy, which is below the achievement of similar school populations.

The strongest domain is spelling.

The granting of Records of Student Achievement (RoSA)

Schools in NSW provide individual assessments for each student enrolled at the conclusion of Year 10. This information is retained by the NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) and is issued to students when they leave the secondary schooling system. At this point students will be eligible to apply for a Record of School Achievement (RoSA)

In Year 10, the RoSA grades are allocated by the school using school-based assessments and aligning student performance with the Course Performance Descriptors. The school-based assessment schedules are issued to students in a Year 10 Assessment Handbook.

On the completion of the Year 11 Preliminary Course, students will be given a Preliminary Course Grade. The grades allocated will be in line with the Preliminary Common Grade Scale and based on student performance in their School Assessment Program. The School based assessment schedules are made available to students in the Preliminary Assessment Handbook. Students who leave at the end of the Preliminary Course are entitled to apply for a Preliminary RoSA. Students who leave the school prior to the completion of the HSC will also be offered the opportunity to complete the Literacy and Numeracy tests offered by NESA. From 2020 a minimum literacy and numeracy standard must be achieved by students to receive a Higher School Certificate. Students will be provided with opportunities to meet these standards in the Year 9 NAPLAN testing and subsequent online literacy and numeracy testing.

Results of the Higher School Certificate (HSC) (secondary schools only)

Congratulations to each of the 35 students of the 2024 cohort who completed their HSC at PCCS and POCS.

Of these students, 10 were full time students with Pacific Online and the remaining 25 students were full time students with Pacific Coast.

Across both campus', a total of 29 HSC courses were offered to students, including 5 Life Skills courses and 3 internal VET courses.

Our students also accessed 4 extension courses – Science Extension, History Extension, English Extension 1 and Maths Extension 1.

Our 2024 cohort was the first group to have gone through without doing any compressed courses in HSC and it was the first group of students to complete their HSC with students across both campus' (POCS and PCCS).

Our goals last year were to:

- Have at least one student with an ATAR above 90.
- A greater number of students achieving above 60.
- Top students to achieve Band 5 consistently.

We are uncertain of the ATAR results of all our students from 2024 and therefore are not able to confidently determine if these goals were achieved or not. However, the analysis of the bands continues to show that many of our top students are achieving Band 4's in subjects where they were expected to achieve a band 5 or above. While we were pleased with the growth in this cohort, we are looking to establish this further with our 2025 cohort.

Our goals for the 2025 cohort:

- Increased number of students in Band 5
- To see at least 3 students achieve a Band 6 result
- To have students receive offers of placements at university in their first preference To achieve an E4 in at least one extension subject

Senior Secondary Outcomes (VET or equivalent) (secondary schools only)

In 2024 Pacific Coast Christian School and Pacific Online Christian School offered Certificate II in Hospitality, Certificate III in Sports Coaching and Certificate II in Early Childhood and Care. Further to this, many students access TVET courses externally to the school and some of the other qualifications were gained in Travel, Tourism and Events, Primary Industries and Human Services.

Description of how school manages student non-attendance

Pacific Coast adopts an attitude of close liaison with families in supervising students' attendance. Absences are noted and followed up both by phone call with the class teacher or if one week absence and by written correspondence. Long term unexplained absences are clarified with the Assistant Principal scheduling a meeting with the family to work with the family to organise Course Completion policy (available in full at the School) which requires, at the Principal's discretion, chronic non-attendance to result in the de-enrolment of the student and referral to the DET Home-School Liaison Officer for the area.

Retention of Year 10 to Year 12

There is a high value placed on education by families in the local area and within the Pacific Coast Christian School. Consequently, there are high levels of student retention for all Schools in the area.

Required retention reports cover both raw numbers between Year 10 2022 and Year 12 2024 and actual individual student retention between these points.

• 35 students completed Year 10 at PCCS in 2022. 24 students completed Year 12 at PCCS in 2024. This produces an actual retention rate of 69%.

Description of how school manages student non-attendance

Rolls are marked each morning during year group Pastoral Care class. Daily text messages are subsequently sent to parents for students absent with the request for their acknowledgement of and reason for the absence. If unexplained absences still exist after a week an email is sent from the administration team to follow up with parents/caregivers.

During this time Pastoral Care and class teachers are also encouraged to reach out to parents if student absence is sporadic or frequent.

Long term unexplained absences (after 3 weeks) are followed up with more formal communication to meet with Principal to discuss attendance plan. Chronic non-attendance will result in the de-enrolment of the student and subsequent report to NSW Department of Education for Home School Liaison to follow up with family.

Retention of Year 10 to Year 12

As our first year 10 students are due to graduate in 2025 - we are not yet able to provide comment on retention of year 10.



Feedback from the data collected stated that students are highly equipped in their creativity, digital literacy and in their holistic development. Almost three in five parents (57%) who were surveyed believe their children are supported extremely or very well to navigate emerging and innovative technologies. A further 42% believe their children are supported somewhat or slightly well, while only 1% believe their children aren't supported well at all. They also agree that the physical environment of their School is conducive to learning.

Teacher satisfaction

Parent satisfaction

72.6% of parents indicated that positive learning culture was a strength of the school with comments listed below:

Student satisfaction

Students are also considered well equipped in holistic development (71%) and communication skills (71%), results which are both consistent with 2023 data.

81 % of stakeholders believe students are extremely/very equipped in digital literacy these results still show a high level of technological capability at the school.

More than four in five stakeholders agree student reports are informative and helpful (82%), and the School is meeting the academic needs of its students (81%). Around three in four stakeholders agree teachers motivate students to learn (78%) and that the school has high academic standards (75%).

Students are similarly equipped in many character qualities. They are considered most well equipped in adaptability (74% extremely/very equipped), their sense of empathy (69%) and persistence (65%).

Teacher satisfaction

Teachers expressed strongly that School leadership values and incorporates their input and feedback and that they enjoy coming to work each day with comments as listed below:




Recurrent/Capital Income

2024






Recurrent/Capital Expenditure
